

RDAC/SEAL candidate news:

Despite the constraints of the ongoing pandemic, the local RDAC SEAL candidate mentoring program managed to operate successfully. Retired Captain and Council Board member Drew Bisset was able to arrange outstanding guest speakers for the weekly Zoom webinars, including: the Deputy Commander of WAR-COM (SEAL HQ), a number of senior medical personnel to provide updates on the virus, Captain Tom Norris (a SEAL Medal of Honor recipient), a former senior DEVGRU Officer to speak on necessary SEAL Officer character traits, a nutritionist, a retired SEAL discussing SEAL history, and several prior RDAC Candidates as they graduated from active duty training.

In the middle of July, in-person physical training resumed at Pugzee Farm and at the Greenwich YMCA pool. It was gratifying to note that the individual training regimens in place prior to the restart allowed the candidates to retain their superior physical fitness.

Also in mid-July, two RDAC Officer Candidates reported to BUD/S training: one from Fordham's NROTC Program and one from the US Military Academy (yes, West Point!). RDAC also transferred three Enlisted Candidates in June and July to Navy Boot Camp at Great Lakes, IL, where they underwent 14 days of quarantine before beginning basic training. 

Adopted ship news:

USS Winston S. Churchill (DDG 81):

For the benefit of our merged new members, our Council "adopted" the Arleigh Burke class guided missile destroyer, USS Winston S. Churchill (DDG 81), following her port visit to Stamford, CT in August 2003. The ship is based in Norfolk and is having a distinguished active service, including receipt of the "Battle E" efficiency award in 5 consecutive years and completing numerous overseas deployments.

Churchill had a change of command ceremony in May, when the incoming skipper, CDR Timothy Shanley, relieved CDR Ben Abbott. CDR Shanley had been Executive Officer of the ship from Dec. 2018 to Feb. 2020. Our Council sends our hearty "welcome aboard" as new CO to CDR Shanley.

In recent weeks, Churchill's officers and crew have been honing their war-fighting skills in the Atlantic, as the photos nearby demonstrate. The ship departed Norfolk on an independent deployment overseas on August 10th.

USS Connecticut (SSN 22):

Our Council adopted the Seawolf class nuclear fast attack submarine, USS Connecticut (SSN 22), in 2016. The sub's motto is "Arsenal of the Nation" in recognition of our state's history, and is based in Bremerton, WA.

Connecticut again participated in the biennial 2020 Arctic Ice Exercise (ICEX), along with USS Toledo (SSN 769). Both subs surfaced through ice in March. ICEX maintains operational readiness and regional stability, while improving capabilities to operate in the Arctic environment. The Arctic Submarine Laboratory (ASL), based in San Diego, established a remote ice station on a moving ice floe that provided a stable platform where a tracking range, sensors, communication equipment and personnel could be safely moved to and from participating submarines.

In other news, LT Robert Chapin from Sheridan WY, Connecticut's weapons officer, received the 2020 "Pilly Lent Award" as the most tactically proficient dept. head in the Pacific sub force. The award is named for the CO who fired the first torpedoes against the Japanese in WW2. Our congratulations to Lieutenant Chapin.

The Council sends our best wishes to Captain Aljilani on Connecticut and Captain Shanley on Churchill, as they and their officers and crews continue operating in defense of our nation.

On 24 July, all 3 of the RDAC BUD/S's candidates in Class 343 finished the infamous Hell Week. This represents an almost 10% share of the class, as only 35 out of the original 72 starters made it to the end! Early in August, RDAC will have 4 Enlisted Candidates graduating with SQT Class 338 and moving on to active duty with SEAL Teams. HOOYAH to them all!

Finally, in the first half of August, RDAC will have 12 prospective Officer Candidates from NROTC Units, the Fleet, and from the civilian world reporting to Navy Special Warfare Command, Coronado to compete in the annual SOAS (SEAL Office Assessment & Selection) Program. This is the largest contingent that the local program has ever sent to SOAS and great things are expected from them!
